## Your donations have helped us on the frontline

Thank you for your incredible support during our latest appeal. Your generosity means that experts like Nurse Gillian can keep seeing as many tamariki in the early years as possible, ensuring that children receive the care they need.

We were able to raise more than \$95,000 over February and March. These funds go to filling the gaps in everything our Plunket nurses need for their important mahi across Aotearoa New Zealand and keeps our community support going in the form of playgroups and parent groups - wraparound care for the whole whānau.

The story of Isla and her hip dysplasia diagnosis struck a chord with many of our amazing donors. No parent wants to see their child go through anything medical; it's a scary, uncertain time. But early detection thanks to the eagle eye of Nurse Gillian meant that Isla was able to be fitted with a Pavlik harness and avoid invasive surgery. She was one of over 1,500 referrals for hip issues that we made in 2023, and thanks to you, we can keep doing so.

Isla is now 18 months old and doing fabulously well. Kerra was able to provide some rather exciting updates: not only is Isla walking and exploring her world confidently, but she's also going to be a big sister in the spring! A huge congratulations to Kerra, Mathew and Isla from Whānau Āwhina Plunket, and a resounding 'thank you!' to our donor community.



# A new building means a new chapter for Plunket services in Rotorua

In February we officially finished our brand-new Rotorua community hub! After 10 years of work and hiccups (like a pandemic!) to plan, design and build, the doors of 1436 Pukuatua Street opened following a warm dawn karakia and blessing.

For generations, Plunket nurses and the wider team have walked alongside Rotorua whānau raising their tamariki. This facility brings all our support services under one roof. Plus, there is space for like-minded community providers who share our vision of supporting families in the crucial early years, so children in the region get the best possible start in life.

But as a charity, there is simply no way we could have ever got to this point of a beautiful hub in Rotorua without the donations we received from incredible supporters like you. A huge, special thanks must go to Generation Homes, Bay Trust, Rotorua Trust, New Zealand Lottery Grants Board, One Foundation, New Zealand Community Trust, Gallagher Insurance, Masfen Foundation, NXP, Plunket Foundation, Rotorua Rotary Club, Rotorua Racing Club, Rotorua Quota, Claymark, Placemakers Rotorua, Panasonic NZ and the many friends of Plunket who have held fundraising initiatives over the years - from degustation dinners to cake raffles.

Our first drop-in clinic was on Feb 1 at the new facility, and the first precious pēpi through was Modecai James, with proud parents Dallas James and Terina Tahuri. Dallas was also a builder on the project – a lovely full-circle moment for the family!

Since its opening, we have seen over 300 children and on dropin clinic days our facility is being used to its full capacity. We are also running two important community services out of the hub – the Parents and Cubs group for caregivers and tamariki to interact, and a Parent Support Group for parents to connect over a coffee or tea. The Rotorua hub is truly a space that allows local whānau to stay engaged and feel supported well beyond those early days with baby.





# A green thumb and a passion for Plunket!

Supporters like you always blow us away with your generosity – including the giving of your time. Volunteers help keep our community services running, so that Plunket can help every whānau who needs us most. And in the case of Ralph Vickers, they also keep our properties up to scratch for visiting children and families.

Mr Vickers is retiring after an amazing 16 years of volunteering for Plunket! In that time, he could be found working in the garden of the Otumoetai clinic in Tauranga, rain or shine. He ensured that the grounds stayed pristine and weed-free for the local whānau and Plunket team. Now in his mid-eighties, he is ready to hang up his trowel.

Otumoetai kaimahi arranged a special morning tea for Mr Vickers and purchased a tree to be planted in his honour after so many years of commitment to the clinic. His daughter, Anna Martyn, who also attended the morning tea, was the former president of the Otumoetai Plunket clinic back in 2010.

"We are so thankful for Ralph's many years of hard work and generosity," says Community Karitāne, Raewyn Davies. "A Plunket baby himself, Ralph is passionate about the difference the organisation makes in the community. His dedication is appreciated not just by the staff that work in the clinic, but also the families that visit."

PlunketLine has become a reliable, 24/7 resource for caregivers of tamariki across the country. And we thank our supportive donor community for helping us keep it running – for generations to come.

Conveniently located in the popular Westgate shopping centre, this hub replaces the former office on Enterprise Drive.
