


Volunteer News



Supporting whānau at Te Matatini



We were thrilled to have a presence at the 'Olympics of kapa haka' - Te Matatini in Ngāmotu/ New Plymouth recently!

During the multi-day event, around 750 people visited our stall which offered a chilled, relaxed space for whanau away from the hustle and bustle of the crowds. We had a nappy change and breastfeeding area, activities for tamariki, exciting giveaways and freebies, plus support available for any child-related concerns or questions.

With an estimated 2.5 million viewers online and an audience of around 70,000, Te Matatini is a major event in the Māori cultural calendar that has continued to grow in size and popularity since it began in 1972.

"It's a natural step for Plunket nurses to become vaccinators and a fantastic opportunity for them to upskill and to work at the top of their scope," says our Chief Executive Fiona Kingsford.


We will focus our immunisation efforts on areas where current services are at capacity and that have the lowest immunisation rates.

A dawn blessing was held in early March with local iwi Ngāi Tai ki Tāmaki and Plunket's Chief Executive Fiona Kingsford in attendance. Staff took part in waiata (song), shared kai (food) and it was great to see representatives from Asian Family Services in attendance.

Clinical Services Manager Joanne Udy says it is hugely important that we ensure access to our services is as seamless as possible for whānau.

"Located in the heart of East Auckland, Botany Town Centre is a really ideal place for us to be. The mall has parent facilities, ample parking and more than 200 stores including supermarkets, so whānau can get their shopping and errands done or even just enjoy a coffee at a nearby cafe when they come in to see us.

"Well Child appointments, drop-in clinics, B4 School Checks and playgroups will be available in our new premises. We will have capacity for other providers such as midwives to use the space too. We've recently shifted from the Pakuranga Plaza and it's great we are now situated in a central area that sees a lot of foot traffic. We're excited to support whānau here."
